INTRODUCTION

This directory and attached analysis, attempts to highlight a significant element of Ireland's ecumenical development; namely the formation of interchurch groups.

In a recent speech to his Diocesan Synod, the Church of Ireland Archbishop of Dublin, Dr John Neill said, 'In a real way, it is the local parish sharing in projects that probably has more appeal these days than the big united services that were so important some thirty years ago in launching the ecumenical spirit'.

However, there is a profound lack of empirical data in this field, particularly in the Republic of Ireland, therefore it is impossible to compare to any other study and say whether this expression of ecumenism in Ireland is on the way up or on the way down.

This first attempt at an island-wide survey, intends to exist as a living, breathing survey on the Irish Churches website (www.irishchurches.org). If any information is outdated or incorrect, then it can be easily altered online by users.

In total approximately 450 groups were vetted for inclusion, with 239 making the final list. Very few of the groups fit a common mould. They all vary and are often highly contextual or specialised. Some have just begun, some are growing, others are declining and others have had their day.

The most important aspect of the research was the qualifications. The original parameters were to identify groups that were:

- · Ongoing
- · Formal or informal
- · Christian faith-based
- · Endorsed by their local churches

However through the research all these terms needed to be expanded to properly capture sheer variety. These are all explained in some depth in the side columns of the analysis.

The overall list therefore may read a little like a Parish list, with some highly notable and recognised inclusions and some not so familiar.

GROUPS THAT SEE THEMSELVES AS ECUMENICAL


This measures the level of ecumenical vision, composition and impact that groups have amongst different denominations in Ireland. The categories range from those that encompass a wide variety of churches, particularly those that are often referred to as 'minority' churches, to those groups that may be very much rooted in one theological or denominational tradition, but can attract outside appeal and participation.

REFLECTING RICH VARIETY OF THE IICM This includes groups whose reach goes beyond the traditional 'big four' and in some instances incorporates Christian churches that are not members of the IICM (Irish Inter Church Meeting). Such groups are more likely to occur at a national level. There are 24 entries in this category, representing 10% of groups.

MULTI-PROTESTANT AND CATHOLIC This includes groups whose representatives include at least Roman Catholic and two different Protestant church members. There are 125 entries in this category, representing 54% of groups. This was the most significant category for a few reasons. Firstly interchurch groups are most likely to form where there are multi-lateral relations rather than bi-lateral relations. Secondly multi-Protestant and Catholic relations, fit an ecumenical stereotype more so than other relations, therefore they are more easily identifiable. Thirdly, Roman Catholicism, Anglicanism, Methodism and Presbyterianism represent over 95% of Irish Christians. Significant proportions of local groups were multi-Protestant and Catholic and they tend to occur in towns or cities where there were at least three denominations present.

CATHOLIC-ONE OTHER This normally arose, where either two churches had specifically engaged on a project, or where Protestants were a minority and only a bi-lateral group could be formed. They tend to occur more locally in the Republic of Ireland, particularly on a Roman Catholic-Church of Ireland axis and were often very difficult to map, especially if small, lay shared Bible study. There are 27 such entries in this category, representing 12% of groups.

CATHOLIC-BASED, PROTESTANT-BASED OR ORTHODOX-BASED This category refers to groups that are rooted and based within one tradition, but are either working to reach out, or are building internal ecumenical capacity. Within the Catholic Church there are those groups that see their mission as 'ecumenical' and also groups that have an ecumenical appeal. Within



Protestantism, there are groups that either follow suit or that simply link the Protestant churches together on certain issues. In this sense Protestants are disproportionately represented here because of the greater diversity of denominations. Shared Methodist/Anglican/Presbyterian churches for instance fall under this category. Within Orthodoxy, there is an initiative to link the Orthodox Church leaders together. These tend to have a regional or national outreach. There are 35 entries in this category, representing 26% of groups.


EVANGELICAL OR CHARISMATIC This category refers primarily to theology more than ecclesiology. For instance many charismatic Catholic groups are ecumenical. However a distinction was made where any evangelical or charismatic group was either disapproving of Catholicism and ecumenism or vice versa, which proved very subjective and difficult to assess. There were many such groups identified but not recorded, a fast growing number being in towns and cities in the Republic of Ireland. Most of those that have been recorded are national groups. There are 24 such entries in this category, representing 10% of groups.

GROUPS THAT ARE HELPING TO DEVELOP ECUMENISM

This measures the extent to which groups are helping to develop ecumenism. It ranges from groups that are overtly and specifically working ecumenically, to those that are developing ecumenism as a bi-product of their work, perhaps despite limited inter-church engagement.

PRIMARY MOTIVATION AND COMPOSITION OF LEADERS These are groups that are ecumenical in origin, membership and output. Groups that had a breadth of denominations within their membership were most particularly recognised, as opposed to those with just an ecumenical vision. There are 61 entries in this category, representing 26% of groups. They tended to occur more at the local level and in Northern Ireland.

PARTIAL MOTIVATION AND COMPOSITION OF LEADERS This was the most significant group, because as with the origins of ecumenism, it is often a positive bi-product of an alternative but common cause. There were 94 entries in this category, representing 41% of groups. They covered a vast range of issues and aspects of church life and sometimes had originated either as a strong ecumenical group, now becoming more community focussed, or viceversa. They tended not to follow any distinctive pattern.

POSITIVE CONSEQUENCE OR OFF-SHOOT OF LARGER ECUMENICAL


GROUP This category covers two groups; firstly those that do not see their mission as ecumenical but for a variety of reasons are now ecumenical in practice. The second part includes groups that are off-shoots of national ecumenically-orientated organisations. There were 29 entries in this category representing 12% of groups.

PRACTICAL RATIONAL, POSSIBLY NON-ECUMENICAL COMPOSITION This includes groups that embrace other denominations, without an explicit ecumenical motivation. One example is Holy Trinity, Inishbiggle, Co Mayo which was a Protestant church but is now shared. There were 23 entries in this category representing 10% of groups.

SHARED THEOLOGY OR ECCLESIOLOGY, LIMITED INTER-CHURCH COMPOSITION This can refer to a broad range of groups, which may be focussed on a very particular aspect of the life of the church, from which ecumenism may occur. They tended not to follow any distinctive pattern. There were 25 entries representing 11% of groups.




CHURCH BASIS OF GROUPS

This measures the extent to which Christian faith influences each group. In doing so, it attempts to differentiate between inter-church groups, which are the focus of this study, and groups that may bring members of different denominations together, but for purposes beyond inter-church issues, such as cross-community or inter-faith. It considers whether groups are clergy or lay dominated and which aspect of the life of the church the groups' impact upon.

CHURCH LEADERS GROUPS This refers to groups that are predominantly clerical. Some groups are primarily for clergy (such as clergy fraternals), whilst others are clergy-led but have a wider focus. They tend to occur where there is sufficient ecumenical clerical capacity within a defined area (usually large towns or suburbs). They are present across the island and are the largest category in this section, suggesting that local ecumenism is dominated more by clergy than laity. The output of these groups often reflects this, with clerical themes differing from lay themes. There are 70 such entries in this category, representing 30% of groups.

LAY GROUPS This refers to groups that are predominantly lay. Groups have varying degrees of relationship with local clergy, but on the whole they are endorsed in their work. They usually address different issues to clerical led groups, particularly around themes of social justice, history and reconciliation. In Northern Ireland, they can be more closely aligned



to the cross-community sector. There are 37 such entries in this category, representing 16% of groups.

CONTRIBUTE TO WITNESS AND WORSHIP This refers to groups that make a positive contribution ecumenically to the mainstream life of churches, as opposed to special interest. Such groups may focus on such themes as education, music or mission. There are 41 such entries in this category, representing 18% of groups.

GATHER AROUND ONE ASPECT OF THE LIFE OF THE CHURCH These are groups that have a single focus in their vision, usually around a special interest within church life, such as art, pilgrimage or employment support. There are 53 such entries in this category, representing 23% of groups.


RESOURCING THE CHURCH This refers to groups, that serve and equip the church and understand their contribution ecumenically, such as bookshops, historical groups, information websites. Almost all entries are based in either Dublin or Belfast, often denoting the groups' national headquarters. Many are also Catholic-based or Protestant-based. There were 31 entries in this category, representing 13% of groups.

GROUP STRUCTURES

This category measures the organisational structure of each group, ranging from groups that are well funded and employ staff, to very informal groups with no formal committee structures. The minimum criterion for inclusion is that the group must have a name. Therefore the research does not include annual ecumenical services (Christmas carols/Good Friday/Pentecost, etc...), nor does it include secular organisations that have annual ecumenical services.

SMALL SIZED ORGANISATION/ENTERPRISE This includes groups that employ staff and have reasonable funding. Most such organisations have a national or regional focus with headquarters located throughout the country and most are run independently from the institutional church (e.g. media and development). There are 29 entries in this category representing 13% of the groups.

OFFICIAL NATIONAL STRUCTURE This includes groups that have either oversight over the whole island or oversight over each country. The majority are therefore located centrally in Dublin and Belfast. Many link professions or groups within the church (such as hospital/university/prison chaplains). Most are normally appointed either directly or indirectly by the institutional church. There are 43 entries in this category representing 19% of the groups.



REGIONAL This includes groups that had provincial, diocesan, district, county-wide or regional oversight. This can occur for instance where there is a cross-border partnership or where one church has initiated an ecumenical project over a broad area. There are 23 entries in this category, representing 10% of the groups.

LOCAL GROUP WITH A FORMAL CONSTITUTION This includes groups that have identified aims and objectives, preferably agreed by a constitution. The groups normally have more longevity and can survive more readily when changes in personnel occur. There are 74 entries in this category, representing 32% of the groups.

INFORMAL These are groups that see themselves as informal. They are much harder to identify and define. They can include clergy fellowship, study groups or groups in early development. There are 63 entries in this category, representing 27% of the groups. Indeed there may in reality be many more such groups, but they can be very cyclical in their existence and can often be centred on a dynamic individual or a particular occasion.



FREQUENCY OF ACTIVITY

This category measures the frequency of each group's public activity. In includes groups that may have a full-time staff member or volunteer, therefore are effectively continuously active, to groups that may work towards an annual goal. It does not include groups that have been inactive for the past year.

CONTINUOUS This refers to groups that are constantly active. There are 82 entries in this category representing 35% of groups. There are a number of reasons why the results were so high. Firstly organisations that have part-time or full time staff, volunteers or lay members were considered 'continuous'. Therefore groups such as ecumenical retreat centres, bookshops and university/hospital/prison chaplains were included. Such groups can be found from South West Kerry to North East Donegal, although there are higher concentrations in the major cities. Most groups have a national or regional outreach. Websites are also considered 'continuous'.

WEEKLY This refers to groups that are less than continuous but are more than monthly in their activity. There were only 14 entries representing 6% of groups. For differentiation, shared churches were recorded here, as were interchurch choirs and prayer groups. Shared study groups were also recorded here although they often occurred for a season at a time. Almost all entries were local.


MONTHLY This records groups who are active at least once a month. There were 53 entries representing 23% of the groups. A significant proportion of entries were clergy groups, although local inter-church also featured a lot.

SEASONALLY This refers to groups that are active less than monthly but more than annually. There are 66 entries in this category representing 28% of groups. There was no distinctive pattern regarding whether groups were local or national, instead time, energy and capacity seemed to predetermine frequency.

YEARLY This refers to a broad range of groups that are synonymous with an annual event. Some groups require a year's worth of planning, meetings and significant funding for conferences, festivals or special occasions such as the World Day of Prayer. Other groups can meet with very little preparation once a year, for a special occasion or agreed event. There are 17 entries in this category representing 7% of groups.

Endorsement and Support

ENDORSEMENT AND SUPPORT OF GROUPS


This measures the extent to which authority is given to groups by relevant churches. It particularly looks at inter-church groups that are funded and directly managed by relevant churches, whilst also examining those groups that are independent but are still approved in what they do. It highlights the extent to which institutional churches are directly developing inter-church relations and the extent to which specialised and independent groups are contributing.

FUNDED AND CO-ORDINATED BY RELEVANT CHURCH /CHURCHES'

BODY This refers to groups that are primarily funded and run by local, Diocesan/District level or National church structures. There were 23 entries in this category representing 10% of groups. While there are many groups that exist with only basic church financial support, this tried to identify groups that have significant investment from relevant church authorities.

NOMINATED REPRESENTATIVES BY RELEVANT CHURCH /CHURCHES'

BODY This refers to groups where members are primarily appointed as church representatives. The churches therefore see themselves as the main stakeholders in the group. It refers for instance to ecumenical chaplaincies where the church appointed but the host organisation funded. There were 18 entries in this category representing 8% of groups.



EMERGED FROM WITHIN FORMAL CHURCH STRUCTURES This refers to inter-church groups that came about from enthusiastic parishes/ congregations or clergy/ministers. Its importance lies in the fact that in being formally initiated it tends to have reporting mechanisms back to the relevant formal church structures. This category tries to distinguish between formal church initiatives and outside initiatives that require buy-in from clergy and parishes. There were 59 entries in this category representing 25% of groups. The majority of entries are local and have a more bottom-up approach to their work.

PROMOTED AND ADVERTISED BY LOCAL CHURCHES ECUMENICALLY This refers to groups that often emerge organically for a common purpose or due to a common bond; however their work is recognised, supported and promoted by a variety of churches. Unlike those that emerged within formal structures, they often do not report directly through local, Diocesan or national church structures. For instance, some clergy fraternals exist without widespread local support, where arms-length awareness is sometimes deemed appropriate. The majority of entries however refer to organisations that are Christian in their origin and values, but work separately to the institutional church. There were 75 entries in this category representing 32% of groups.

WORKING WITH THE KNOWLEDGE AND BLESSING OF A CHURCH

LEADER This refers to groups that do not have active participation from local church leadership, but are approved in their work nonetheless. Some groups are special interest or may require particular expertise not possessed by local church leadership; therefore they're happy to work independently. This was also a highly subjective category because some groups had the approval of some local ministers and some did not and it was not possible to always get a balanced range of opinions. There were 57 entries in this category representing 25% of groups. There was no apparent geographical trend with any of the above categories.

INITIAL RECOMMENDATIONS

DEVELOP NEW ECUMENICAL GROUPS New local and regional initiatives between churches should be facilitated. Such groups might especially target specific gaps highlighted in this research, such as youth, young adults and geographical areas.

CAPACITY BUILDING OF LOCAL ECUMENICAL GROUPS Existing local ecumenical groups should be strengthened and local leadership supported. Some of the services that should be provided include:

NEEDS ANALYSIS Groups should be assisted to identify their challenges and opportunities.

FUNDING Many ecumenical groups in Northern Ireland and border counties have either been influenced by or originated from cross-community initiatives and funding. Therefore separate funding streams and development mechanisms need to be identified particularly for local groups in Northern Ireland and the Republic and particularly in such a restricted context.

LOCAL ECUMENICAL PARTNERSHIPS As with other countries, perhaps a formalised system of registering and developing Local Ecumenical Partnerships should be considered.

SOCIAL RESEARCH There is a need for more information and a greater analysis of varying aspects of ecumenical development. This would primarily act as a public resource, which would be available online. It could also help identify areas of growth and decline in Irish ecumenism. Such projects might include:

GEOGRAPHICAL NEEDS ANALYSIS This would involve a mapping of all Christian churches in Ireland, alongside religious population statistics, which could then be measured against the results of this research, to more properly identify where on this island the ecumenical challenges and opportunities arise.

SUB-GROUPS This would involve the mapping of ecumenical sub-groups, which are off-shoots of larger ecumenical organisations, such as every WWDP group, Alpha group, YMCA group, Christian Union, Gospel choir, etc...

TOTALITY OF IRISH CHRISTIANITY There is a need to encourage greater dialogue and inclusion particularly at a local level between IICC member churches and non-IICC church members. Part of this would require:

NETWORK DEVELOPMENT There are a number of smaller, umbrella organisations, linking Christians across a variety of axes, such as Protestantism, Orthodoxy or evangelicalism or Pentecostalism. Sustainable relations should be developed between IICC members and such groups because they often represent the building-blocks upon which inter-church dialogue can take place. Often there are bridge-builders that are capable of linking the two and they should be supported in their work. Also many of the groups, such as those recorded here, are National organisations and in some instances, dialogue then proves more feasible, because of greater capacity and independence.

REVIEW ECUMENICAL RESOURCES There is a need for a review of the impact of ecumenical resources such as the World Day of Prayer and Week of Prayer for Christian Unity in Ireland. For some groups they form a central part of their existence however there are a wide spectrum of beliefs regarding their value, from very positive to very negative. It would therefore be useful to gauge their effectiveness.

STRENGTHEN PARTNERSHIP Existing ecumenical partnerships should be strengthened, encouraged and networked with others.

TERMINOLOGY There were many groups that were either uncomfortable with or unused to ecumenical language or understood it in narrow terms. There is a need to revisit the use of the word 'ecumenical'.

DATA/INFORMATION There is a need for the provision of effective/useful information and resources for the use of various groups and an up-to-date database of key contacts within member churches. Some of the particular needs include:

EDUCATION There is particularly a need for ecumenical education resources in the Republic of Ireland, where Secondary Schools religious resources address many ecumenical themes, sometimes adequately and sometimes inadequately. There is also a need for adult education ecumenical resources.

COMMUNICATIONS There is a need for increased church and public awareness of ecumenical activity and greater networking of existing resources.

SHARING INSTITUTIONAL RESOURCES There is a need for greater partnership amongst the instruments of institutional church, such as hospital, prison and university chaplains. In some instances there are wonderful groups in place and sometimes far better partnership could be developed. Also the churches should be encouraged to work closely at large events (e.g. National Ploughing Championships) or when organising large events (e.g. youth festivals).
